

# EPBC 2012/6521 2022 Annual Compliance Report Yoongarillup Mineral Sands Project



1 January 2022 to 31 December 2022

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#### **Report and Scope**

The Yoongarillup Mineral Sands Project (EPBC 2012/6521) was declared a controlled action as per the EPBC Act 1999 on 26<sup>th</sup> September 2012 and following the submission of the project referral was granted conditional approval on 26<sup>th</sup> August 2016.

The Project was also granted State Ministerial approval (Ministerial Statement 1030) in June 2016.

The scope of this Annual Compliance Report is to satisfy Condition 6 of EPBC 2012/6521, addressing compliance with each of the conditions of the approval for the 2022 calendar year.

### A. YOONGARILLUP MINERAL SANDS PROJECT SUMMARY

#### A.1 PROJECT LOCATION, PROPONENT AND OVERVIEW

The Doral Mineral Sands Yoongarillup Mineral Sands Project was granted Ministerial Statement 1030 in June 2016 to extract ore from the strand of heavy mineral deposit located within Mining Tenements M70/458 and M70/459, 17km southeast of Busselton (Figure 1), Western Australia. Approximately 4,000,000t was expected to be extracted from the deposit to produce 256,000t of heavy mineral concentrate (HMC) per annum. HMC product generated from mining the deposit includes zircon, ilmenite and rutile.

The Project has a total disturbance envelope of 95.71ha. Of this area, 86.81ha is located within previously cleared land currently used for farming activities (i.e., agriculture/pasture) and 8.90ha is located within State Forest No. 33 (managed by the Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions; DBCA).

The Yoongarillup mine was operational until 2nd November 2020. Although rehabilitation of the land has been progressive during this time, the site has now transitioned into a wholly rehabilitation and closure operation. Access to open pits and site supervision are being maintained for inspection purposes and to enable surface water management whilst rehabilitation earthworks are conducted.

#### **B. SUMMARY OF MINING OPERATIONS**

#### B.1 SUMMARY OF OPERATIONS FOR 2022

#### 2022 Operation

Dewatering ceased at the Yoongarillup Mine site on  $22^{nd}$  October 2020. Mining operations ceased on  $2^{nd}$  November 2020 and the site entered the decommissioning and rehabilitation phase.

Rehabilitation activities continued throughout 2021 including the back filing and profiling of the final pit voids and process water dam. The site is now considered rehabilitated however, some rehabilitation repair work will be undertaken in 2022.

Emission and Monitoring Locations can be seen as Figure 2. DWER PartV Licence L9018/2016/1 was surrendered in January 2023 ceasing the requirement for further monitoring going forward.

## C. COMPLIANCE

#### C.1 COMPLIANCE WITH EPBC 2012/6521

The Yoongarillup Mineral Sands Project (EPBC 2012/6521) was declared a controlled action as per the EPBC Act 1999 on 26<sup>th</sup> September 2012 and following the submission of the project referral was granted conditional approval on 26<sup>th</sup> August 2016.

The Project was also granted State Ministerial approval (Ministerial Statement 1030) in June 2016.

EPBC 2012/6521 includes 8 conditions as tabled in Table C-1 below and during the 2022 there were no non-compliances to report.

Land disturbance activities commenced on 3 <sup>rd</sup> January 2017. Formal notification was forwarded to the DAWE within 30 days on 20 <sup>th</sup> January 2017 and was acknowledged on the 31 <sup>st</sup> January 2017.
5	The approval holder must maintain accurate records substantiating all activities associated with or relevant to the conditions of approval, and make them available upon request to the Department. ## D. LAND OFFSETS

## D.1 LAND ACQUISITION AND MANAGEMENT PLAN

Following the granting of Ministerial Statement 1030, as per condition 8-2 a Land Acquisition and Management Plan (LAMP) was prepared in consultation with the Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions (formerly Parks and Wildlife). The LAMP is inclusive of EPBC 2012/6521 Condition 2, and was submitted to the Department of Water and Environmental Regulation DWER (EPA) on 22<sup>nd</sup> November 2016 and approved on 6<sup>th</sup> December 2016. The LAMP was made publically available on the Doral website <u>www.doral.com.au</u> following approval.

The LAMP contained several options for the securing of a direct land offset including 12 potential sites along the Whicher Range and an additional site not on the Whicher Range, which was identified by the DBCA with significant conservation value. Throughout the investigation of these landholdings, limited availability of privately held native vegetation on the Whicher Scarp which would satisfy the area or quality requirements of MS:1030 and EPBC 2012/6521, led to further investigation of the identified land which was not on the Whicher Range. Throughout this investigation in consultation with the DBCA, the DBCA advised DWER that the purchase of the nominated 134ha of land and its ongoing management for conservation provides the best environmental outcome as an offset to counterbalance the significant residual impact to the 8.9ha of Whicher Scarp Native Forest Ecosystem of the Yoongarillup Mineral Sands Project.

A letter was forwarded to the CEO of DWER (EPA) on 23<sup>rd</sup> August 2017 to request their approval as per MS:1030 Condition 8-2 2(d) for the nominated 134ha offset land to be located outside of the Whicher Scarp Native Forest Ecosystem. This request was approved by the CEO on 21<sup>st</sup> September 2017 and acknowledging that both Condition 2 of EPBC 2012/6521 and Condition 8-2 had been met.

Following the CEO (Director General) for DWER approval for the nominated land, the funding arrangement for the land by DBCA was enacted and the procurement of the land commenced. This was acknowledged by the CEO on the 27<sup>th</sup> September 2017 (Figure 3) and the purchase agreement was finalised on 16<sup>th</sup> November 2017.

Survey and fencing of the offset land as managed by DBCA was undertaken in March 2018.

## E. GROUNDWATER EXTRACTION

## E.1 PIT DEWATERING

Dewatering ceased on site on the  $22^{nd}$  of October 2020, with mining operations ceasing on the  $2^{nd}$  of November 2020.

## E.2 YARRAGADEE GROUNDWATER

A total of 4530kL was extracted from the Yarragadee bore during the 2022 period (Table E-1). This is a much reduced volume from previous years as a result of the final rehabilitation of the Yoongarillup site now complete.


The Yoongarillup site is now completely rehabilitated.


